¹²Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? ¹³ But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁴ And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain. ¹⁵ We are even found to be misrepresenting God, because we testified about God that he raised Christ, whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. ¹⁶ For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. ¹⁷ And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. ¹⁸ Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. ¹⁹ If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied.

#2: The Gospel Is Biblical (3-4)

³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures

#3: The Gospel Is Historical (3-8)

³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ <u>died</u> for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴ that he <u>was buried</u>, that he <u>was raised</u> on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁵ and that he <u>appeared</u> to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶ Then he <u>appeared</u> to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷ Then he <u>appeared</u> to James, then to all the apostles. ⁸ Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me.

#4: The Gospel Is Doctrinal (15:3)

³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died <u>for our sins</u> in accordance with the Scriptures

#5: The Gospel Is Personal (15:1-11)

Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which <u>you</u> received, in which <u>you</u> stand, ² and by which <u>you</u> are being saved, if <u>you</u> hold fast to the word I preached to <u>you</u>—unless <u>you</u> believed in vain.

³ For I delivered to <u>you</u> as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for <u>our</u> sins in accordance with the Scriptures,

#6: The Gospel Is Practical (15:9-10; 12-58)

Effect #1: Humility (9-10)

9 For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. 10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me.

John Newton said, "I am not what I ought to be, I am not what I want to be, I am not what I hope to be in another world; but still I am not what I once used to be, and by the grace of God I am what I am."

Effect #2: Hard Work (10; 58)

10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me.

"Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" (15:58).

Effect #3: Harmony (11)

Effect #4: Hope (12-58)
